# **Healthy Minds & Bodies**

older adults and people with disabilities in Minneapolis Public Housing received in-home support or community health worker services helping them to maintain stable housing

2,175 older adults and caregivers received support and education on dementia and other chronic health conditions, increasing their ability to remain healthy and in their home

older adults and people with disabilities confronting food insecurity and isolation received nutritious meals and community connections

children and adults received mental health support, treatment, and case management services improving their stability and engagement with their communities

**kids** with chemical dependency and/or mental health illness received residential treatment



# **Access & Opportunities**

**8,413** young people stayed engaged in school

**1,389** older adults, people with disabilities, caregivers, and professionals received education, support, and services that balanced protection of adults whose capacity is in question with promoting the benefits of dignity and self-determination

**1,093** individuals received wraparound supportive services that address the educational, employment, healthcare, housing, and family relationship needs of people re-entering society following incarceration

**1,255 people** accessed affordable estate planning legal services and probate planning

# **Community Belonging**



- 850 men and women received relationship-based mentoring and supportive service
- 226 older adults facing financial hardships connected with community-based services to support healthy aging and social connections
- 193 currently or previously incarcerated men and women connected with volunteer mentors
- 108,457 hours of service provided by 963 volunteers

# Safe & Stable Homes



- 725 older adults and individuals with disabilities resided within affordable, service-enriched housing or received in-home support services improving their housing stability and engagement with their communities
- **475** family members remained stably housed
- 243 men and women supported in the transition back to community with transitional housing or home-based support following incarceration
- 44 young people safely housed in shelter

# **Spiritual Well-Being**



- 800 hours of interfaith chaplaincy training provided to men inside Stillwater Correctional Facility
- 22 incarcerated men who have completed interfaith chaplaincy training now serving as spiritual care providers inside state prisons
- 12 prayer calls held by VOA MN/WI Staff
- 8 VOA MN/WI commissioned ministers and 7 interfaith chaplains provided spiritual care for 14 VOA MN/WI programs
