Authorizing Program Mission: Volunteers of America-Minnesota (VOA-MN) Charter School Authorizing Program will improve all pupil learning and all student achievement with service to others as its core.

Authorizing Program Vision: Volunteers of America-Minnesota (VOA-MN) Charter School Authorizing Program will authorize high quality charter schools that improve all pupil learning, all student achievement, and promote service to others.

Authorizer Summary:

In 2000, the Minnesota state legislature made it possible for a non-profit organization in Minnesota to authorize charter schools. Volunteers of America-Minnesota (VOA-MN) became the first non-profit charter school authorizer in the nation. In the years that we have been authorizing, VOA-MN has developed and practices a model of charter school authorizing that goes beyond the compliance-based role vaguely outlined in state statute. We engage in proactive relationships and add value to the schools with which we work. During the startup phase, VOA-MN works closely with founding groups to ensure that tasks necessary to a successful opening (facility, finance, human resources, marketing/recruitment, curriculum development) are accomplished promptly. Once operational, VOA-MN continues to vigilantly monitor the academic, board governance, operations, and financial performance of its schools through frequent communication, school site visits, board meeting observations, and regularly reviewing of school documents. When signs of trouble arise, we work closely with the school's board and management team to problem-solve and identify resources that may be helpful. This is a departure from the traditional reactive relationship between charter school authorizers and schools.

VOA-MN has much to offer charter schools in the way of expertise in non-profit management, board governance, public school finance, and school performance. Our track record of responding to emerging community needs with effective social service programs and highly experienced authorizing team makes our organization particularly qualified to authorize charter schools. We recognize the great challenges and difficulties charter school development and operation and can help schools to navigate this complex process while respecting the autonomy and uniqueness of each school.

The VOA-MN Charter School Authorizing Program is proud of our history of quality oversight, the quality of the schools in our portfolio, and the School Network Collaboration initiatives we continue to foster. Our school collaboration

initiatives are ongoing and intended to help charter schools live up to the promise of increased autonomy in exchange for quality performance. Working together (collaborating) our 19 schools are stronger than a single school would be navigating challenges on its own.

As a VOA-MN authorized charter school, you are not just a charter school, but a part of the bigger VOA-MN Charter School Network of 19 schools, which promote peer leader relationships between schools by facilitating school network informal discussion times and creating professional development opportunities for participants—whether as a board member, school leader, or community member.

The network of charter schools meets informally weekly via Zoom and gathers annually during our two-day Annual Minnesota Charter School Leadership Conference promoted by Volunteers of America-Minnesota. In 2023, the conference was opened to all charter school leaders and board members who wished to attend regardless of their authorizer and other authorizers also participated. VOA-MN decided to open the conference to the leadership of all Minnesota charter schools to further share best practices between school leaders. The National Charter School Institute partnered with VOA-MN on the expanded conference.

Each June during the conference, the VOA-MN leaders also vote on a School Leadership Team (SLT) who help develop and guide collaboration initiatives and help develop the agenda for the Annual Minnesota Charter School Leadership Conference. Each collaboration initiative provides leaders with the opportunity to regularly share ideas on effective educational and operational strategies/ proven practices, offers peer mentoring to new leaders, and together broaden individuals' understanding of the charter school community throughout Minnesota.

Describe the progress your organization made on its organizational goals related to authorizing in FY 2024.

Progress and associated activities included in blue text below for each goal and strategy/activity.

GOAL 1: High Quality School Choice: Build a portfolio of charter schools committed to excellence in education, financial management, and governance.

Improve currently authorized schools: Provide oversight of school progress meeting VOA-MN performance standards, including that:

- Schools have adopted a formal teacher evaluation process and adhere to the requirements set forth in state statute (Minn. Stat. 122A.40). VOA-MN Academic Standard 4: The school has adopted a formal teacher evaluation process and adheres to the requirements set forth in Minnesota Statute 122A.40. Most VOA-MN schools meet this standard.
- All teachers are supported through a school-wide professional development plan based on analysis of assessment data and linked to improving pupil learning and student achievement. VOA-MN Academic Standard 5: All teachers are supported through a school-wide professional development plan based on analysis of assessment data and directly linked to improving pupil learning and student achievement. Most of our schools are meeting this standard.
- Schools are compliant with financial and governance laws and VOA-MN standards. Monthly oversight tracks the
 extent to which schools are meeting our VOA-MN governance and finance standards. During FY24, VOA-MN
 continued to be proactive in our oversight, especially regarding reviewing board packets before the board
 meeting to ask questions and provide technical assistance as needed to avoid violations of law.
- Schools implement Intervention/School Improvement Plans when needed to facilitate improvement. When necessary, VOA-MN has discussions with school leadership regarding the potential need for the school to close. If/when the board is unable to reach a determination on closure, authorizer VOA-MN will fulfill our responsibility and close the school if the school is not making necessary progress meeting contract performance standards &/or financial obligations. During FY24 VOA-MN had three schools in Intervention Green Isle Community School, KIPP Northstar Academy and Athlos Academy St. Cloud. Due to a steady decline in enrollment over the years, Green Isle Community School was unable to meet financial obligations, and the school board voted to close at the end of the 2023-2024 school year.
- Within CSAP capacity, increase the number of charter schools in the VOA-MN network by 1-2 schools per year if applicant meets the VOA-MN performance standards. VOA-MN did not receive any New School Applications in FY24. VOA-MN did have one preoperational school – Heartland Lakes Community School, that successfully opened in fall 2024.

GOAL 2: Quality School Performance: Create and maintain systems of charter school performance review that support analysis, reflection and planning, and implementation of continuous improvement measures for the charter schools we authorize.

Related Strategies and Activities Utilize the charter school network to create a culture of continuous improvement among charter school leaders:

- The VOA-MN Charter School Authorizing Program (CSAP) will continue to use the Charter School Network approach to build organizational and operational capacity among charter schools in our portfolio. CSAP will continue to encourage collaboration and mentoring between leaders of VOA-MN Authorized charter schools.
- The Annual Charter School Leadership Conference promoted by VOA-MN will continue to include opportunities for school leaders and board members to access training and network with other schools. The annual conference will also include an opportunity for discussion and strategies for dissemination of "best practices."
- During FY24, VOA-MN continued to offer Friday leadership meetings (virtually) and the elected School Leadership Team (SLT) members checked in regularly with new school leaders. The VOA-MN also continued our

School Collaboration Website and Leadership Listserv, two initiatives that promote sharing of best practices and support between our school leaders.

Revise systems to support the balance of accountability and autonomy:

• Consistently communicate expectations to school leaders.

VOA-MN continues to publish three Network Performance Reports annually – School Academic Performance, School Governance, and School Finance. Authorizer VOA-MN also publishes school-specific "Scorecards" which contain an analysis of the extent to which each school has met all performance standards contained in their charter contract and are on-track for charter renewal.

• Increase oversight and support for struggling schools.

During FY24 VOA-MN had three schools in Intervention – Athlos Academy St. Cloud (AASC), Green Isle Community School (GICS) and KIPP North Star Academy (KNSA). Authorizer VOA-MN increased our oversight presence at all three schools and the Financial Analyst increased technical assistance, oversight, and training since all three experienced declining enrollment and related financial challenges.

Provide public transparency and acknowledge high performance.

• Maintain the VOA-MN Network Performance Reports on the CSAP website.

VOA-MN continues to publish three Network Performance Reports annually – School Academic Performance, School Governance, and School Finance which are published on our VOA-MN website. We also maintain our Authorizer Annual Report and Income and Expenditure Reports on our VOA-MN website.

• Encourage schools to achieve the VOA-MN Awards of Excellence in the three pillars: academic program, financial management, and school board governance.

AWARDS ACHIEVED BY GROUP

<u>ACADEMIC</u>: The VOA Academic Excellence Award is based on the North Star Academic Progress Report as figured by the Minnesota Department of Education. Schools that reached a combined average state-determined minimum achievement level of (Increased + Maintained) of 58.7% or higher qualify for the award. (In 2024, the combined statewide average (math + reading) was 58.7%. This score was calculated by adding the statewide math and reading results and then dividing them by two.)

 All VOA-MN authorized charter schools are contractually required to have a schoolwide plan for service learning tied to outcomes and include student/school outcomes in their Annual Reports. 100 percent of VOA-MN schools had schoolwide service-learning plans tied to outcomes and included outcomes in their Annual Reports.

GOAL 4: Voice in state public policymaking: Maintain a strong public presence in state education policymaking. Related Strategies and Activities VOA-MN team members will:

• Participate in state and national charter school organization meetings at least six times annually to influence public policy and to advocate for the charter schools.

During FY24, VOA-MN participated in A-GAME meetings convened approximately quarterly by the National Charter School Institute. VOA-MN was unable to be a member of the Minnesota Association of Charter School Authorizers in FY24 due to budget constraints.

• Continue to collaborate with local charter school stakeholders to build a community of authorizers.

During FY24, VOA-MN invited other charter schools and authorizing organizations to participate in the Annual MN Charter School Leadership Conference promoted by VOA-MN. It is anticipated that school and authorizer participation in the statewide conference promoted by VOA-MN will continue to grow.

• Share VOA-MN oversight tools and assistance to other authorizers, locally and nationally.

VOA-MN continues to publish three Network Performance Reports annually – School Academic Performance, School Board Governance, and School Finance housed on our website. Our authorizing program manual is also housed on our website for the public, including other authorizers, to view.

- Help educate the legislature and public about the role of the authorizer and its benefits to improving quality public education.
- During the 2024 Legislative Session, VOA-MN promoted legislation to amend the authorizer fee to account for schools that operate additional school sites. Though that legislation did not gain momentum in 2024, it is our hope that it will in the future. We continue to coach our school leaders on the importance of inviting legislators to their schools and contact their legislators proactively on legislation that would benefit charter schools.
- Maintain relationships among charter school authorizers.

VOA-MN has close relationships with many authorizers. We do not hesitate to contact any authorizer for feedback on challenges, suggestions on how to improve our affidavits, or to share our best practices when asked. In addition, in June 2024 VOA-MN promoted the addition of an authorizer workshop day as part of the Annual Charter School Leadership Conference.

GOAL 5: National presence and collaboration: Build excellence in authorizing in Minnesota and nationally through participation in the National Association of Charter School Authorizers and collaboration with colleagues in our field.

Related Strategies and Activities Actively develop and utilize national best practices and resources:

• A VOA-MN representative will annually attend a national meeting and/or conference.

During FY24, the VOA-MN Authorizing Team was unable to attend a state or national conference.

• Seek opportunities to share quality practices with colleagues, locally and nationally.

VOA-MN continues to house on our website our Authorizing Manual and Network Performance Reports. We also continue to welcome questions from other authorizers and opportunities to provide feedback. To the extent we are able, VOA-MN participates in the A-GAME national initiative headed by the National Charter School Institute. In addition, in June 2024 VOA-MN promoted the addition of an authorizer workshop day as part of the Annual Charter School Leadership Conference and incorporated well-respected national speakers into the conference.

Authorizer Self-Evaluation (A.9)

Describe how your organization self-evaluated its internal ability (capacity, infrastructure, and practices) to oversee the portfolio of charter schools over the past year.

In June, each Performance Analyst and the Program Assistant participate in an Annual Performance Review process facilitated by the Program Manager before their contract is renewed. This process incorporates self-reflection and a discussion on how much the Analyst is meeting their expected performance and oversight responsibilities. The process also includes a discussion on areas for improvement in their roles and responsibilities, the setting of personal goals for the following fiscal year and plans for professional development aligned to those goals and continuous improvement. Goals are based on both Analyst performance and ongoing authorized school needs assessment.

We have full-day team retreats twice annually. Retreats foster meaningful discussions of our authorizing practices and school performance. More specifically, team members bring forth any concerns with our schools or authorizing practices and we devise a plan of action for resolving the concern if possible.

Additionally, Authorizer VOA-MN includes an addendum to each Network Performance Report that contains the extent to which all our schools are meeting our performance standards. Through analysis of that addendum, we form a plan to help our schools on any standards with weak performance.

The VOA-MN Authorizing Program also conducts a survey of our schools annually to determine the extent to which our schools feel satisfied with our authorizing program, including level of autonomy, authorizer response time, quality of oversight, authorizer representative professionalism, etc.

VOA-MN Employee Management Meetings: Monthly standing meetings occur between Senior Program Manager and Division Director. The agenda for these informal meetings includes discussion of how much our program is meeting performance and budget expectations and a plan for implementing any identified areas for improvement.

Corporate Management Meetings: The Program Directors and Managers meet quarterly. These meetings are to discuss program progress, the extent to which the corporation is meeting performance and budget expectations, and plan for implementing any identified areas for improvement. The Management Meetings also included professional development on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). The Division Director and Program Manager participate in a more formal goal-based performance evaluation process, set by the corporate leadership of VOA-MN, semi-annually (mid-year progress check-in and end of year full evaluation). Corporate VOA-MN also requires all employees and contractors that have VOA-MN emails to participate in Data Practices / Privacy training and pass an exam at the end of the training.

Authorizer High-Quality Authorizing Dissemination (A.10)

VOA-MN disseminates authorizing tools, documents, and information through its website and upon request. The Annual Minnesota Charter School Leadership Conference promoted by VOA-MN is open to ALL charter schools and authorizers to participate. The conference was opened/expanded based on the belief that sharing of best practices between charter schools and authorizers and providing opportunity to further build relationships and collaborate, are important to the continued growth of quality chartering in Minnesota.

All our initiatives from FY23 continued in FY24.

- Individualized Technical Assistance VOA-MN employees and contractors provide support and technical assistance for school leaders/board members frequently. Board training on various topics is provided upon school request and free of charge (ex. topics: Board vs. Management, Open Meeting Law). VOA-MN representatives provide information and services to member schools that help them succeed while allowing them to use their own resources and infrastructure for continued success. Our School Performance Analysts provide all new school leaders and board chairs with one-on-one review of the VOA-MN performance standards and respond to any questions.

These videos have been especially helpful to school board members.






Both the chart and the table above illustrate the 2024 math proficiency for the VOA-MN network of charter schools. The green line indicates the state average 45.5%. Three schools in the VOA-MN network, Bluffview Montessori School, Harbor City International School and Woodbury Leadership Academy met or exceeded the statewide average on the 2024 math MCA. In addition, five schools in the VOA-MN network, Birch Grove Community School, Green Isle Community School, Lakes International Language Academy, PACT Charter School, Schoolcraft Learning Community and Spectrum High School scored within ten percentage points of the statewide average. The remaining eleven schools scored below 35.5% on the 2024 math MCA. This is an area for continued improvement for all the schools in the VOA-MN network of charter schools. As an authorizer, VOA-MN will continue to emphasize the importance of data-driven decision making at the school level as well as academic goal-based professional development.

Both the chart and the table above illustrate the 2024 science proficiency for the VOA-MN network of charter schools. The green line indicates the state average 39.6%. Seven schools in the VOA-MN network, Bluffview Montessori School, Harbor City International School, Lakes International Language Academy, Schoolcraft Learning Community, Southside Family Charter School, Spectrum High School and Woodbury Leadership Academy, met or exceeded the state average on the 2024 science MCA. In addition, three schools in the VOA-MN network, Athlos Leadership Academy, Kaleidoscope Charter School and PACT Charter School FIT Academy, scored within ten percentage points of the statewide average. The remaining nine schools either scored below 29.6% on the 2024 science MCA or did not have enough a testing cell large enough to record a score.

Governance Performance

Performance of VOA-MN Schools on Governance Standards for FY 24

The authorizer regularly monitors the performance quality of the school board based on authorizer observations; interviews with the director, board, and faculty; and the review of school policies, reports, and board meeting minutes. A school must have a governance model that provides quality oversight by ensuring that there are checks and balances between the board and the school administrators.

The VOA-MN Charter School Authorizing Program publishes annually a School Board Governance Report on their network of authorized charter schools. The report gives a single annual source on the board operations and compliance of the fifteen VOA-MN- authorized charter schools. Authorizer VOA-MN also observes a minimum of one school board meeting annually.

The VOA-MN determined school board governance standards contained below are uniform for all VOA-MN charter schools. The standards are contained in VOA-MN Charter Contract Addendum B (School Accountability and Authorizer Oversight System) and serve as the basis for both annual monitoring of school board performance and contract renewal determinations. The authorizer will monitor school performance meeting these standards on an ongoing basis and the standards shall be evaluated in the annual VOA-MN Network Governance Report. The standards also serve as the criteria for contract renewal determinations. The authorizer reserves the right to have flexibility to amend these standards /expectations as needed.

VOA-MN's school board governance standards / expectations include the following:

Governance Standard 1. The Board of Directors met its governance model requirements laid out in its bylaws and membership requirements as required by Minnesota Statute*.

Governance Standard 2. The Board of Directors has the necessary knowledge to carry out the responsibilities contained in Minn Stat 124E.07, Subd. 6. (Duties), including knowledge in finance/budget, policy/legal, personnel/employment, and education.

Governance Standard 3. The board adheres to an orientation process for bringing on new members.

Governance Standard 4. The Board of Directors complies with initial and ongoing training requirements set forth in Minn. Stat 124E.07, Subd 7 (Training): governance, financial, and employment policies and practices.

Governance Standard 5. The Board of Directors completes a self-evaluation each year.

Governance Standard 6. The Board of Directors will comply with MN Open Meeting Law, Chapter 13D, and maintains a quorum for all board meetings.

Governance Standard 7. The board regularly reviews, updates, and approves its bylaws. The bylaws are consistent with state law.

Governance Standard 8. The Board of Directors adheres to board member election requirements set forth by state statute*.

Governance Standard 9. The Board conducts an annual evaluation (including all aspects of the position description) of the performance of the school leader through a defined annual evaluation process.

Governance Standard 10. The Board has a board-approved professional development plan for the school director (if applicable as required by Minn. Stat. 124E.12, Subd. 2*.

Governance Standard 11. The Board of Directors monitors the organization's adherence to school board policies.

Governance Standard 12. The Board of Directors complies with Federal data practices law and the Minnesota Data Practices Act (Minn. Stat. Chapter 13) *.

Governance Standard 13. The Board of Directors provides ongoing oversight of school academic performance.

Governance Standard 14. The school maintains a high level of parent, teacher and student satisfaction rates based on school surveys conducted and student/faculty retention rates.

Governance Standard 15. Board documents are distributed to all board members at least 3 days prior to a board meeting.

Governance Standard 16. The Board of Directors maintains a Board Documents Binder which includes meeting minutes, bylaws and articles of incorporation and financial statements; and statutory requirements for posting board related information on the school's website*.

Governance Standard 17. The board has a policy review calendar and reviews and updates its policies as needed or required by state law.

ANALYSIS: Overall, VOA-MN Schools use highly effective governance practices as demonstrated by meeting most or all of the 17 standards. 7 schools met all the standards. An additional 8 met over 90% of the standards. So, 14 or 73% met over 90% of the standards. All schools met over 80% of the standards. Cumulatively, VOA-MN Schools met 94.4% of all standards. When boards meet most or all these standards, it means that they:

- o pay attention to the development and training of their board members,
- o are attentive to the important work required of charter boards,
- o provide oversight of the academics and employees,
- o are following statutory responsibilities, and
- o are committed to continuous improvement.

STRATEGY FOR IMPROVEMENT MEETING / MAINTAINING GOAL: The main strategies for increasing the number of schools demonstrate full compliance with the VOA-MN Governance Standards and win the Governance Award involve education, training, and communications. VOA-MN will review the FY24 evaluations with school boards and leaders to make sure they know exactly what they need to do and document to win the award and meet all the standards. The

VOA-MN Governance Analyst provides training on the VOA-MN standards during the year as requested and provides a training video on how to meet the 17 standards. VOA-MN provides an annual report template to schools to help them know what standards can be addressed in their annual report in the fall of the year. VOA-MN Governance Analyst also keeps a running record of compliance regularly throughout the year and provides friendly reminders through regular contact with school leaders/board chairs throughout the year. VOA-MN uses a board observation rubric aligned to the Governance Standards as another opportunity to provide feedback on meeting standards. They are also provided a midyear Dashboard that is an opportunity for them to self-evaluate what standards are met midyear and what standards still need to be met for FY25.

Management and Operations Performance

Effective daily operations of a charter school support the Learning Program. A well-run school provides an environment in which staff and students can perform at the highest possible level and more effectively reach the school's goals. Management and operations of the school will be monitored and reported by the authorizer using the Formal Site Visit Rubric. The standards also serve as the criteria for contract renewal determinations.

VOA-MN SCHOOL FINANCIAL STANDARDS

The VOA-MN Charter School Authorizing Program provides high quality financial oversight of its network of schools. These schools' pride themselves on being part of a cooperative venture where ideas are shared and input from school leaders is valued and used to strengthen all members.

The VOA-MN determined school financial standards serve as the basis to monitor member school's financial health and compliance with state and federal laws, including proper use of public funds. In addition, the standards are used to evaluate school financial performance and to determine the VOA-MN Finance Award recipients.

There were 19 operational schools during FY24 and one school was closed at the end of the year. Ten key performance indicators used to evaluate VOA-MN authorized charter schools include:

- The school maintains a balanced budget.
- The school is compliant with state and federal financial reporting deadlines and laws, including the proper use of public funds.
- The school's financial audit will be submitted to the Minnesota Department of Education, Office of the State Auditor and the authorizer by December 31.
- \circ $\;$ Schools are expected to have audits that are free of all findings.
- The school is current on all financial obligations, including pension payments, payroll taxes, insurance coverage, loan payments and terms.
- The school provides VOA-MN and school board members with monthly financials. June financial reports may be delayed until year-end journal entries are completed. Packets include at least the following: 1) detailed income/expense report, 2) cash flow projection, 3) check register, and 4) current enrollment (Average Daily Membership). The board should review and approve the financials at each board meeting.
- The school develops and maintains a targeted General Fund balance determined by the school board. For the finance report, VOA-MN also determines a standard for fund balance annually based on items such as school funding trends and funding holdbacks.
- The school board has a finance committee that meets regularly to review financials.
- All finance committee members exhibit working knowledge of financial oversight.
- The school is not in Statutory Operating Debt (SOD).

One school (in red font) did not submit financial audit reports to the authorizer for FY24 due to the school's closure, therefore certain performance indicators could not be scored. This will be indicated with XX's in the following table.
